- Make sure that you use some <u>onomatopoeia</u> in your poem.
- Find some words that make a good <u>rhythm</u> when you put them together. (Can you make up a line that sounds like the rhythmic thunder of horses' hooves as they gallop towards each other?)
- Try to use alliteration: look for words that have similar sounds
- Decide if you want to include some noisy sounds and some quieter ones, for a poem of contrasts, or if you just want a REALLY NOISY poem.
